

GRIGGS FAVORS SUNDAY GOLF.

Ex-Attorney General Elected Captain of the North Jersey Team.

PATERSON, N. J., May 23.—Ex-Attorney General John W. Griggs, who is an expert golf player, has been elected Captain of the golf team of the North Jersey Country Club, which has an excellent eighteen-hole course at this place. Mr. Griggs spends much of his leisure on the links, and is not opposed to Sunday golfing.

The North Jersey team under the Captaincy of Mr. Griggs played its first game of the season on Saturday and defeated the Ridgewood team.

LOCAL GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

Douglas Will Defend His Title This Week at Garden City.

Findlay S. Douglas, the metropolitan golf champion, will defend his title this week in the annual tournament of the Metropolitan Golf Association, which will begin tomorrow on the links of the Garden City Golf Club. This will be the sixth competition for the local championship, the first event in 1899 having been held at Garden City. Findlay Douglas has held the title twice. Walter J. Travis has also been twice victor, and Herbert M. Harriman was the first winner.

There are seventy-two entries for this week's tournament. Besides Douglas, among the other prominent competitors will be Daniel Chauncey, J. M. Ward, L. L. Kellogg, Jr., Charles B. Macdonald, R. C. Watson, Jr., George T. Brokaw, Percy R. Pyne, Jr., A. M. Robbins, Grenville Kane, E. S. Knapp, Jasper Lynch, Archibald Graham, W. Fellowes Morgan, Samuel Frothingham, P. R. Jennings, J. G. Batterson, N. B. Cole, and C. C. Mason.

The committee made the draw yesterday. The first pair will start at 9 o'clock in the thirty-six-hole qualifying round, which will occupy all of the first day's play. The first thirty-two will continue on the following days at match play for the championship, while the third and fourth sixteens will play for separate cups. Douglas is paired with Macdonald.

Olympic Golf Tournament Prizes.

An attractive booklet, containing numerous illustrations and a detailed account of the golf links, has been issued by the officers of the Glen Echo Country Club at St. Louis, where the Olympic golf tournament will be played from Sept. 19 to 24. Besides the championship cup, offered by the club, a number of other prizes have been presented, so that there will be opportunities for all classes of players to win something. A number of English golfers have been invited to compete, and it is expected that several will be in the tournament.

The Glen Echo course has a playing length of 6,235 yards for the 18 holes, and particular attention has been paid in perfecting the greens. The entries closed on Sept. 12, with T. W. Gerould, Chairman of the Golf Committee, Department of Physical Culture. A fee of \$5 must accompany each entry. A number of special events will also be held during the Olympic golf week.

Whitestone Field Club Tennis.

Mrs. Arthur Van Sicklen and James I. Merritt were the winners yesterday in their respective events of the progressive lawn tennis tournament of the Whitestone Field Club of Whitestone, L. I. The tournament was the opening of the series that is to continue through the Summer. Mrs. Van Sicklen, who as Miss Florence Horseman was among the most expert of the women players of Brooklyn, won eleven games and lost four. The second prize in the women's singles was won by Miss Kate Poppenhusen, who was tied with Mrs. Van Sicklen, and was defeated by the latter on the playoff. James I. Merritt won the first prize in the men's singles with fourteen games won and only one defeat. Dr. Lucien R. McCallum took the second place, with twelve games won and three games lost. Among the best matches of the series was that in which William Handley met Merritt. Handley was very good at volleying and passing, and gave Merritt a close match. The second tournament of the club is expected to reach the finals on Saturday, June 4.
